Mass Imprisonment in America


N Tuesday, Feb. 4, at 6:30 p.m., join us at the West Regional Library for a presentation and book signing with author/historian Sam Mihara.

During World War II, Mihara, a second-generation Japanese American born and raised in San Francisco, was imprisoned with his family at Heart Mountain, Wyo. He was just 9 years old and was one of 120,000 people of Japanese ancestry forced into prison camps by the United States government. Mihara and his family lived in one 20-by-20-square-foot room in a barrack for three years.

After the war ended,
Mihara returned home to San
Francisco. He attended LickWilmerding High School and
earned engineering degrees
at University of California,
Berkeley and UCLA graduate
school. He worked as a
rocket scientist for Boeing
Company and later became
an executive in charge of
space programs.

Mihara is a national speaker on mass imprisonment and a lecturer on the topic at UCLA, U.C. Berkeley and Harvard. For his work, the National Council for History Education honored Mihara in 2018 with the prestigious Paul A. Gagnon Prize, the first for a Japanese American.

In addition to traveling the country to speak about mass imprisonment, Mihara also gives his time as a board member of the Heart Mountain Wyoming Foundation, the nonprofit




organization that oversees the National Historic Landmark site. He helped with the preservation of the prison site, which includes an awardwinning museum and original camp structures.


The African American Heritage Collection




COME and experience our African American Heritage Collection at the Virginia Dillard Smith Branch Library. The collection showcases materials from African American history and culture and primarily comprises two collections: noncirculating print reference titles including multivolume sets, and circulating print titles. The titles, mostly written by African American authors, are on topics of particular importance in African American history.

Multivolume noncirculating sets in the reference collection include: "Black Women In America"; "Africana: The Encyclopedia of the African and African American Experience"; "Encyclopedia of African History and Culture"; "Ebony Pictorial History: Black America"; "Afro-American Writing"; "Encyclopedia of African American History 1896 to the Present"; "Encyclopedia of African American History, 1619–1895"; and "The Negro in American History 1567–1971."

The circulating titles include biographies, speeches, poetry and







materials focusing on segregation. Highlights are: "The Civil Rights Era"; "To Be a Slave"; "History of the Alabama State Teachers Association"; "Black In Selma: The Uncommon Life of J. L. Chestnut Jr."; "The Right to Fight: A History of African Americans in the Military"; "Tuskegee's Heroes"; "Equal!: The Case of Integration vs. Jim Crow"; "Blacks in Classical Music"; "The Cotton Club" and "The Autobiographies" by Frederick Douglass.

Unique topics covering whole historical eras are represented in the collection with these titles: "Black Americans in Congress – 1871–2007"; "Mobile Alabama's People of Color: A Tricentennial History 1702–2002"; "A Right to Read: Segregation and Civil Rights in Alabama's Public Libraries 1900–1965"; "African American Artists 1881–1987"; and "A Biographical History of Blacks in America Since 1528."


Use the Library on Your Digital Device

CloudLibrary offers books and audio books for adults, teens and children. Patrons may check out 10 items at a time and keep them for 21 days.






Kanopy has a large selection of streaming movies. Enjoy critically acclaimed films, inspiring documentaries, award-winning foreign movies and more. These movies can be watched on your preferred device or cast to a smart TV.

Flipster has a variety of popular magazines available right from your tablet. Download the app and enjoy current magazines such as Rolling Stone, Better Homes and Gardens, Us Weekly, Discover and Essence.





Hoopla has a large array of streaming movies, television series, music, e-books, audio books, and comics. Patrons can check out 10 items per month. Movies/TV series check out for 3 days, music for 7 days and e-books/audiobooks check out for 21 days.

Pronunciator is a fun and free way to learn more than 80 languages. It provides lessons for any skill level and proficiency. The courses can be intensive 8-week sessions or quick "travel phrases" tutorials. Lessons are tailored to young children, teens or adults.



Make Your Own Flair in Our Maker Lab

AKING at the Mobile Public Library doesn't always require high-tech tools such as 3D printers and vinyl cutting machines. Sometimes we go back to the basics and create with our manual maker tools.
