Teach Your Children to Pick Their Own Books

BEING able to choose motivates children to read more, develop more skills and enjoy reading. What is a good mix of choice and guidance?

- 1. Step back and let them try to choose something. For example, if your child wants to read a book about monsters, you might say something like, "I'm not sure a book about monsters is a good fit, but what do you think?"
- 2. If you think a book is not right for your child, give the reasons why. For example, "The last time you read a book on monsters, you had nightmares. Do you remember how scared you were? I don't want that to happen to you again."
- 3. If you do not think the book is appropriate, give two good options. For example, "You can't have the monster book. Choose one of these instead."

In addition to reading skills, reading choice benefits their lives in general as it provides practice in making thoughtful, responsible choices.

Surprising (and Tearless) Ways to Develop Your Child's Reading Comprehension Skills

HAS a teacher told you that your child is not reading at grade level? If your child is reading at level, would you still like to develop her/his skills? Increasing a child's reading level is often frustrating for parents and children. However, there are excellent, tearless ways to develop reading comprehension.

After the first grade is a good

time to start allowing children to choose their own books — with your guidance.

Children read more when they see other people reading. Do you read in

your child's presence? Family read-alouds are a good choice to model the fun of reading, expand vocabulary and develop comprehension skills.

Reading a variety of materials is essential to fostering literacy growth. After finding a book they like on grade level, let them choose a book they want to read even if it is below grade level or above it. When a child is interested in reading a book above grade level, the motivation often compensates for any reading difficulties. Reading below level increases reading speed and fluency.

You may be surprised as to what is included in effective reading material. Any continuous text develops reading skills. This includes comics, gaming manuals, fiction and nonfiction, magazines and newspapers. Yes, you read that correctly: Gaming manuals are effective reading material.

What about comic books and graphic novels? Yes, comic books

are real reading. Since the 1940s, studies have shown that reading comic books has the same benefits as reading novels. In 2020, a graphic novel won the John

Newbery Medal for the most outstanding contribution to children's literature.

Here is another surprise: audiobooks help develop reading skills, including decoding and comprehension. Also, like reading, they promote well-being and emotional intelligence.

Studies consistently show that students learn more when they enjoy what they read whether it is at, below or above grade level. They are more likely to remember new words and develop deeper comprehension skills. Reading enjoyment predicts reading success.

Children who complete the challenge receive a medal and certificate to celebrate their achievement. If the current challenges aren't your cup of tea, there's always a new challenge in the works.

Beanstack is great for more than just our regular reading challenges. Do you find yourself browsing titles and wondering whether you've read something? You can easily log what you're reading by scanning the ISBN barcode with your phone and later search your reading log in the app to see what you've read already.
